SUBJECT: 2025 Report of Accomplishments, Work Activities/Goals, & 2026 Work Plan

DISCUSSION

This year our general goals and organizational goals will continue to set the expectations of LAFCO as we make progress towards building relationships and developing a succession plan setting the organization foundation for a long-term productive future. Thanks to the Commission for all of your time, hard work and commitment to the work we do at LAFCO. We appreciate your vision, thoughtful questions, and careful attention to detail in making decisions.

The LAFCO Staff of Natasha Lopez, and addition of Ila Fennell have once again been key to our accomplishments. They have been dedicated and diligent in completing their work. They have gone the extra mile to serve the public and other stakeholders during this challenging year. Their efforts are much appreciated and vital to doing what we do.

Finally, Amber Holderness, LAFCO Counsel, has been invaluable this year given the controversial and potentially legal issues potentially faced. Amber's efforts and willingness to be available 24/7 are so appreciated.

This last year SBLAFCO was very productive, with the support of and positive contributions from our partner agencies. As each proposal is considered, LAFCO continues to learn and grow as an organization through the varied and unique experiences

that we encounter in changing the governing structures in Santa Barbara County. As LAFCO Commissioners and Staff join the organization we all continue to “acquire” wisdom and expertise along the path.

What have we learned this year? I think a few things come to mind: that LAFCO has a significant role in shaping the agencies that serve the communities in our County. The Sphere of Influence and Municipal Service Review Update program plans for the future growth of the 8 Cities, 38 Independent Special Districts and the 16 Dependent Districts.

We have also learned (or re-learned) that the LAFCO process provides a setting for the discussion of important issues that affect the provision of services to communities in our County. Tackling the meaningful and important topic of urban growth and the need for future development while protection of vital agricultural lands is one of these important issues.

We thank you for that opportunity and look forward to what promises to be another exciting and interesting year. Below is a summary of the past year

SUMMARY OF 2025

In 2025, Santa Barbara LAFCO has been involved in important proposals and projects, prepared staff reports and comments, wrote a Municipal Service Review, spearheaded Memorandum of Agreement talks, awarded a SALC Grant, evaluated Spheres of Influence, participated in CALAFCO program activities, and a number of other issues. LAFCO has carefully considered a variety of issues and complex proposals and has continued to make objective decisions based on local circumstances and conditions. LAFCO Staff has served the Commission, other agencies, property owners and the public with respect and responsiveness. We continue to be dedicated to that purpose in 2026 and look forward to another challenging and productive year.

PROPOSALS PROCESSED TO DATE

Santa Barbara LAFCO staff processed a number of proposals this year. The processing of a proposal includes working with the jurisdiction, property owner, and/or community group to prepare the application, gather information, referral of the proposal to other interested agencies, analysis of the proposal including CEQA review, preparation of staff report, maps and Power Point presentation, public noticing, mailing the staff report, posting on the LAFCO Website, and presentation at the LAFCO hearing. Currently, a proposal now takes 60-90-days from submittal to hold a hearing. The following is a listing of proposals we have completed or are working on this year.

SPHERE OF INFLUENCE UPDATE AND MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW PROGRAM

The Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act requires that all jurisdictions (Cities and Special Districts) have their Sphere of Influence (SOI) updated and a Service Review completed every five years. In January 2025, the Commission has authorized a Multi-Year Work Program that includes regular service reviews and sphere updates each year. Work on the following Sphere of Influence and Service Updates and associated activities are anticipated to be completed or started this year:

In addition, work is complete for the SOI/MSR regarding Healthcare, Mosquito Vector Control, Cemetery, Housing Mediation, Broadband, School and Solid Waste Services.

1. Adoption in December for the Healthcare, Mosquito Vector Control, Cemetery, Housing Mediation, Broadband, School and Solid Waste Services SOI/MSR Update; preparation of study area maps and descriptions.
2. Adopted and updated Spheres of Influence for the seven Cemetery District, one Municipal Improvement District, one Healthcare District, one Mosquito and Vector Control District, one Community Services District (CSD).

Work has begun for SOI/MSR regarding Fire, Law Enforcement, Safety & Crime, and Emergency Medical Services Municipal Service Review. This service review included 12 agencies that included updating the Spheres of Influence for the Carpinteria/Summerland Fire, Montecito Fire, County Fire Protection Districts,

OTHER KEY ACTIVITIES

Report regarding City and Special District Selection Process. The City Selection Committee, comprised on the mayors or their designees, makes the City member appointments to the Commission. City Council members meet on a regular basis because they also serve on the Santa Barbara Council of Governments (SBCAG), and the Santa Barbara County Air Pollution Control District (APCD). Special Districts, assembling a quorum (20 members) of the special districts for a meeting of the Special District Selection Committee, or LAFCO runs a mailed ballot election.

Election Appointments. A mailed -ballot election was conducted for Regular seat with Commissioner Johnson was elected. Alternate City member Mosby was appointed. Regular Public and Alternate Public Members were appointed.

Monitored State legislation and informed the Commission of the various pieces of legislation that might affect LAFCO.

Fiscal/Budget. Work to complete and filed Financial Statements for FY ending June 30, 2024. Considered and approved the Fiscal Year 2025-26 LAFCO Budget and regular disbursement/Quarterly Budget Status Reports. Each transaction from the LAFCO budget is paid by processing a draw warrant or journal entry through the County's financial tracking system.

CALAFCO is the statewide organization of LAFCOs and is dedicated to meeting the continuing educational needs of LAFCO staff and tracking legislative activity in Sacramento. Regular updates, as needed, are given to inform the Commission on related matters.

Meetings and Public Information. LAFCO staff have and will continue to attended and participated in a variety of meetings and activities related to implementing the CKH Act.

Conditioning authority/engagement was reported on for updating spheres of influence. Factors and tools available for the Commission outlined best practices, policies, and codes outlining authority. Appropriate engagement with cities to determine SOIs were explored.

SUMMARY OF 2025

In 2025 Santa Barbara LAFCO completed the analysis and processing of a number of proposals, LAFCO Staff provided information and assistance to the public, agencies, developers, and others involved in LAFCO activities. 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WORK PLAN - JANUARY 2026

This document is the Work Plan for Santa Barbara LAFCO in 2026. LAFCO's overarching legislative goals include the following:

- **Encourage Orderly Growth and Development.** LAFCO considers proposals for the formation of new local governmental agencies including Cities and Special Districts. LAFCO is also responsible for considering annexations and detachments for agencies. LAFCO also determines the Sphere of Influence, which is a plan for the probable physical boundary of a City or Special District.
- **Promoting Efficient Provision of Public Services.** LAFCO reviews proposals based on a variety of factors including: a plan for services submitted by the agency, resource and infrastructure capacity, and the need for services.
- **Preserve Agricultural Land Resources.** LAFCO considers the impact that a proposal may have on existing agricultural lands with focus on prime agricultural lands. Santa Barbara LAFCO has adopted specific policies regarding the preservation of agricultural resources.
- **Discourage Urban Sprawl.** Urban sprawl can best be described as irregular and disorganized growth occurring without apparent design or plan. By discouraging sprawl, LAFCO limits the misuse of land resources and promotes a more efficient system of services by local governmental agencies.

Goals in 2026

1. Serve the Commission and the public by providing accurate, clear and well-organized information for decision making.
2. Treat the public, applicants, Commissioners, and any stakeholders with respect and patience. Listening with consideration and responding in a calm, courteous manner.
3. Serve the Cities, County and Special Districts by providing information about LAFCO's purpose and the processes LAFCO is authorized to complete.
4. Process proposals in an efficient manner; consistent with the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act, CEQA and other state laws.
5. Implement the Sphere of Influence/Municipal Service Review Update Work Plan, while working on applications and other topics at the same time.
6. Provide the Commission with regular status reports regarding upcoming proposals, Sphere of Influence Updates, Legislative Activities, and the Budget.

7. Participate in CALAFCO events to improve the Commission and Staff's expertise.
8. Inform the Commission and Public regarding various local governance issues and processes by providing regular status reports and study sessions.
9. Monitor the new legislation in the State legislature that may affect LAFCO.

Organizational Goals

1. Continue building relationships with each organization and a lasting trust with them.
2. Continue Succession Plan development and mentoring employees to continuously improve in the following ways:
 - Leadership, knowledge of business operations, hands on implementation;
 - Budget development, technical knowledge of CKH, training opportunities;
 - Preparing of Municipal Service Reviews and Sphere of Influence Updates;
 - Processing of applications from start to finish being mindful of important dates and processes;
 - Increase knowledge of Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act; and
 - Provide the opportunity to make public presentations.

Implementation of our succession plan will establish SBLAFCO as an organization of high-quality professionals that inspire to make employees competitive for any position by developing competent skills, technical knowledge, leadership, through mentoring, job shadowing, training, and hands on practice with the goal of sharing employee's knowledge, creating stability, continuity, engagement, and retention.

3. Implement the awarded SALC planning grant for the Santa Barbara County Agriculture and Natural Resource Initiative.
4. Continue to provide timely and accurate information for agenda items, budget questions, and other policy related questions.

Most of these proposals have not been submitted, it is uncertain if all proposals will be submitted this year or within the next fiscal year, but planning and environmental work is being completed on each of these proposals. LAFCO Staff continues to monitor each project and provide comments at the appropriate times.

SPHERE OF INFLUENCE/MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW UPDATE

Sphere of Influence & Municipal Service Reviews. The current statute requires LAFCO to update the Spheres of Influence for each jurisdiction every five years. The Sphere of Influence is based on a service review. An outline of the review is provided below. The Commission has adopted a Multi-Year Work Plan that updates the MSR's on a regular basis that considers resources services. The upcoming SOI/MSR will cover Police/Fire/EMS Services.

The Sphere of Influence is a boundary that identifies areas a jurisdiction might serve over the next 20 years. The Municipal Service Review provides information about a jurisdiction's ability to serve its existing service area and other SOI areas. The MSR is an informational document that summarizes the existing service situation of a jurisdiction. The Service Review compiles information provided by the jurisdiction.

Other information from the County Planning and Development Department, State Controller's Office, County Auditor's Office, and other agencies is also used to prepare

the SOI and MSR. LAFCO Staff reviews, summarizes and evaluates the various studies and data and prepares a Draft Sphere of Influence Update and Municipal Service Review.

A Municipal Service Review is prepared in accordance with Section 56430 of the California Government Code. This code section was updated in 2012 to include seven factors. The Service Review contains information and written determinations regarding each of the factors provided in the Service Review which include:

1. Growth and Population projections for the affected area.
2. Location and characteristics of any disadvantaged unincorporated communities
3. Present and planned capacity of public facilities and adequacy of public services, including infrastructure needs or deficiencies
4. Financial ability of agencies to provide services
5. Status of, and opportunity for, shared facilities
6. Accountability for community service needs including governmental structure and operational efficiencies
7. Any other matter related to effective or efficient service delivery, as required by commission policy

Also, administrative and organizational information is collected and evaluated. In order to complete a review LAFCO relies on Audit Reports submitted to the LAFCO and County Auditor Controller's Office pursuant to state law, original formation filing documents, State Controllers Special Districts Annual Financial Reports, the General Plan, Capital Improvement Plans, various studies and information from various websites.

CITIES

The 2026 Work Plan focus on adoption of Spheres for all Cities. In addition, we will embark on Cities that provide Police/Fire/EMS Services. The SOI update for Cities will occur either first quarter or after pending direction from Commission. In 2016 Staff updated the spheres of influence for many of the Cities and more than five years have passed. Typically, annexations or other proposals could temporarily delay these updates while applications are being processed to meet statutory deadlines. Below are the Cities and the five-year update schedule:

Memorandum of Agreement (MOA). A MOA should be developed to improve communication and coordination in planning for future growth and development between a Cities and the County. Currently, no City has an MOA with the County. A Memorandum of Agreement between the City and County would be reviewed and amended to reflect any changes to the Sphere of Influence and provisions that are agreed to by the County and City.

An MOA can provide more detail about what type of development might be expected in the SOI and assist in defining the boundary. This helps clarify expectations and provides guidelines that help guide future projects in the SOI. The MOA can also be used to specify a particular planning process or policies for specific areas. Also, the MOA should address other issues such as water resources and agricultural/open space preservation. A comprehensive SOI/MSR Program should focus on areas of communication and coordination between the Cities and County.

SPECIAL DISTRICTS

The 2026 Work Plan focus on all Districts that provide Police/Fire/EMS Services. Staff recommends that the schedule for updating the SOIs and MSRs for the Districts follow the Multi-Year SOI/MSR Work Plan, unless an alternative approach is selected.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICTS

There are numerous Community Services Districts that are providing a variety of services to County residents. These Districts found below provide services that have been activated by LAFCO including: water and wastewater, fire protection, street lighting, roads, storm water, transportation and solid waste. Each of these Districts is subject to the principal act in the Government Code 61000 – 61250 and has an independent Board of Directors.

OTHER SPECIAL DISTRICTS

There are numerous other Special Districts that are providing services to County residents and visitors. MAPPING PROGRAM

The Santa Barbara County Surveyor staff prepares the maps that are an essential part of all reports. The Surveyor's office continues to implement and improve LAFCO's Geographic Information Systems (GIS) mapping program. This program produces a number of important deliverables including the updated Service Areas and Spheres of Influence for all Cities, Special Districts, and County Service Areas in the County. LAFCO is responsible for helping to maintain the boundaries for jurisdictions throughout the County. The County Surveyor office provides a history of annexations online through an inventory of all annexations and sphere amendments. This inventory includes a general directory, basic information, and summary maps. Maps are created for each annexation and sphere of influence update considered by LAFCO. Mapping is a key piece of LAFCO's service capability.

CALAFCO ACTIVITIES

CALAFCO is LAFCO's statewide organization that provides educational opportunities, follows and facilitates the discussion of issues on a statewide basis. The LAFCO EO serves CALAFCO by providing help as needed and requested. Staff and Commissioners have been involved in the continuing education process by participating in the annual CALAFCO Conference and attending the Staff Workshop. CALAFCO also offers virtual education opportunities with CALAFCO U sessions that include AICP and MCLE credits viewable on their website.
